## **Greenville County Bird Club Trip Report**

Don Faulkner and Paul Serridge headed down early to NE Georgia to search for the recently reported Northern Lapwing in a field off Alma Lane in Bulloch County, and the Snowy Owl on Tybee Island. We arrived at Alma Lane at 10.30 where we were joined by Chris, Justin, and Noah Clack. We also found several birders from different parts of the country-two were from Illinois! One of them already had the N. Lapwing in view which made it very easy to get on the bird. ABA area lifer!

The next stop was Tybee Island where the Snowy Owl was quickly located as it perched on the roof of a condo. By way of the exterior stairway excellent views were offered by the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor of an adjacent. A life bird # two for Don, Chris, and the Clack boys. It was later determined that the owl was not seen again after this day!

The Clack family moved on to Christopher Island, where they successfully located their sought-after Western Kingbird. Paul and Don traveled to the Savannah NWR in search of a Cinnamon Teal, which we did not find. In fact it had last been reported 5 days earlier and so was probably long gone. However, the visit to the NWR was successful – close looks at American Bittern and Sora.

We spent the night in Walterboro and visited Donnelley WMA and Bear Island on Friday, experiencing a drastic change in weather from warm to a cold, damp, windy day accompanied by torrential downpours. Fortunately by 2:00, the weather had cleared and the afternoon's birding was very pleasant. Mary's House Pond at Bear Island held 500+ Am. Avocets and 120+ Tundra Swans. Because the rain had turned the WMA roads into a thick gooey mess we did not venture into the refuge and stayed around Mary's House Pond and Bennetts Point Road.

Friday and Saturday nights were spent in Georgetown. Lewis Burke joined the duo on Saturday morning. The original plan of visiting Huntington Beach SP on Saturday was cancelled due to the weather, cancelling a venture to the jetty at the HBSP. Added were trips around Mullet and Mallard Ponds, and the Education Center. We did make a few forays out of the park (mostly to be in the car and stay dry!). The Litchfield Inn area gave close looks at a Clapper rail; Murrells Inlet boardwalk yielded 2 Am. Oystercatchers and an immature Great Black-backed Gull; and a small marsh / beach area to the north of the HBSP entrance where people dump oyster shells held lots of shorebirds.

On Sunday the weather was fine – cool but NO rain in sight – and we finally made it to the jetty at HBSP where the birds of the day were Razorbills and Piping Plovers. We did not go to Santee Coastal, which was a pity because two birders reported a Eurasian Wigeon there on Sunday morning. A lifer missed!

We tried the Garden City Pier before leaving but it was closed for the season. The pier can be good for Eiders and other sea ducks. On Sunday all we saw was a Common Loon.

In all we listed 115 species, far short of last year's 138, but, given the weather a satisfactory total. We enjoyed the trip and proved on Saturday that if you gut it out you can get good birds in the rain!
