Greenville County Bird Club Trip Report

Date: July 27 – 28, 2013

Locations: Allendale Kite Fields, Orangeburg Super Sod Farm, Bear Island WMA, and Donnelley WMA

The club had a remarkable outing to a few locations in the coastal plain, not only in quantity of species, but also in quality. Four of us made the drive down, and bumped into some others along the way. We started Saturday birding at Millet Road, northeast of Allendale, where we had unbelievable numbers of Swallow-tailed Kites (over 300), as well as good numbers of Mississippi Kites. See the photos below for some idea of the numbers. We stopped at Furse Pond briefly, where we saw some fledgling Common Gallinules, before having lunch in Allendale. After lunch, we checked out some areas south of Allendale, where we found more kites, Blue Grosbeaks, and an Orchard Oriole, although we dipped on Dickcissel, one of the targets of this area.

For Saturday afternoon, we went to the Super Sod farm at Orangeburg, where we found a number of good shorebirds, including Upland Sandpiper, as well as Common Ground Dove and Horned Larks. We also spotted a soaring Wood Stork, quite an unusual sight this far inland. We grabbed dinner and spent the night in Walterboro.

We started Sunday morning with a large flock of Tree Swallows accumulated on the power lines just outside Bear Island WMA. While observing them, we had a group of Black Terns fly by, one of our seven species (!) of terns for the weekend. As we proceeded into Bear Island, we picked up Loggerhead Shrike, and the first of several Least Bitterns, which seemed to be everywhere. We moved quickly to the impoundments at the end of Pecan Trees Road to find the previously reported Wilson's Phalarope, which was swimming around not too far off. We also found Black-necked Stilts, White Pelicans, Roseate Spoonbills, and several species of terns here, including Black, Gull-billed, Forster's, Common, and Caspian, along with a few shorebirds.

At the impoundment at the end of Ti-ti Road, we found another large group of shorebirds, including Semipalmated Plovers, Stilt Sandpipers, both Dowitchers, and several peeps, including one that gave the impression of a White-rumped Sandpiper before disappearing behind the reeds. We were also lucky enough to locate a second Wilson's Phalarope! We also had nice looks at Clapper Rail, Roseate Spoonbill, and Wood Storks here.

That afternoon we headed to Donnelley WMA, where we picked up more nice species. At the Savage Backwater area, we found several Black-bellied Whistling-ducks and spotted a Purple Gallinule. Near the lodge, we managed a look at a Yellow-throated Vireo and a Painted Bunting, which we thought we'd heard in a couple of other spots.

We had a great trip, finishing with 108 species. The full list and some other resources are below.
