Five GCBC members took an exciting weekend trip to the SC Coast, stopping in Santee on the way. We started at the Bluff Unit of Santee NWR, running into some old birding friends and making a few new ones as we made our way to Cantey Bay looking for waterfowl. The fog was thick and the birds were far out into the bay making identification somewhat difficult. However, we managed to find 10 species of waterfowl. Hundreds of Canada Geese were in the nearby fields, along with 22 Sandhill Cranes. After meticulously searching through the incredible number of geese, we found eight of the rare Greater White-fronted Geese gathered in a group. A couple of loud planes flew overhead, flushing most of the birds over to the water of Cantey Bay. Rushing back to the bay, we were able to see two Greater White-fronted Geese as they flew back towards the fields from which we had just left. It was worth the exercise to finally get good views of one of the target species of the trip. After lunch, the weather drastically turned colder. We headed over to the Cuddo Unit for a quick trip around the loop, managing to find among other things, a single Rusty Blackbird foraging in the woods.

In order to catch the end of the low tide, Sunday began with an early morning trip to Pitt Causeway where we had extended and close-up views of Marbled Godwits, Black-bellied Plovers, American Oystercatchers, and Dowitchers, before heading north up the coast to catch the boat.

Departing from McClellanville heading towards the northern end of CRWR, with less than optimal weather, (a 50 degree day that felt like 25) our tour covered some of the best spots for wintering wildlife off the coast of SC. Due to the high tide, hundreds of American White Pelicans and American Oystercatchers huddled up on a sandbar. On several occasions, we were also able to take great looks at dolphins. We followed four Common Loons and one Red-throated Loon up the estuary, with multiple opportunities to compare the two species. While we weren't able to find the elusive Long-billed Curlew, we did manage to spot a Whimbrel along the way. The Captain of the boat knew the best sparrow spots and brought the boat up within feet of groups of Seaside, Saltmarsh, and Nelson's Sparrows. At one point, there was a Saltmarsh Sparrow within inches of the side of the boat. Coastal Expeditions did a great job leading and educating the participants, while also making the expedition fun. Don't pass up any opportunity to go on a trip with these guys. Even with the less-than-ideal weather, we are ready to go again!!
